Also on the plus side, Trustees Ron Slinn, Kevin Appelget, Andrew Kulley, Bob Murray and I (as an alternate), have participated in meetings with the township administration in developing Individual Property Plans for open space parcels which remain undeveloped or still farmed. West Windsor Township has purchased the development rights to the Appelget Farm; FOWWOS was not involved in the agreement, but I was delighted to speak in favor of it in front of the Township Council. Also, FOWWOS began tabling at the Farmers Market in September, and intends to do so again next season.

## Grovers Mill Pond Restoration Complete

After over forty years of discussion and planning, Grovers Mill Pond has been restored. The long-awaited final steps of the dredging took place in November with the final removal of the dredging equipment that had dug out over 150,000 cubic yards of silt and vegetation that had built up and clogged the 37-acre lake during its 250-year lifetime. The newly transformed lake should now become an attractive spot for water-based recreation, and the foul odors of rotting vegetation that frequently emanated from its surface during the summer will be a thing of the past. The silt deposition site at Community Park will be regraded next summer.

As long ago as the 1960s, studies showed the need for pond restoration, but for decades there was always some issue that prevented anything from actually being done.

Not until this decade did a satisfactory plan emerge through the cooperative efforts of West Windsor Township, the N.J. Department of Environmental Protection, the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, and the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, a plan that shared the cost among the township, the state, and the federal government.

A key element in the planning for restoration was the township-funded 1978 study of the pond's ecological condition conducted by Allied Biological Control Corporation. This study revealed, among other things, that the eutrophic conditions in the pond required drastic reductions in the level of phosphorous compounds. These compounds, which entered the pond with centuries of runoff from farms in the watershed upstream, promoted the

## Trail Walks

Trustees Kevin Appelget, naturalist, and Ken Carlson, President of the West Windsor Bicycle and Pedestrian Alliance, have been co-hosting a series of trail walks and trail cleanup events. Over the year, thanks to Kevin and Ken, the Zaitz Preserve trails were cleared and marked, a bridge was constructed and installed so that people could gain access from a new entrance off Southfield Road next to the Public Works facility, and a nature walk was held to introduce the public to this newly accessible amenity. Trail clearing was also performed and a nature walk also held at the Millstone and Rogers Preserves, during which people enjoyed the woods, familiarized themselves with the paths, and learned about the plants and birds common in the area. Unfortunately, the day set aside for walking in Bridegroom Run Park, the largest contiguous West Windsor-owned preserved open space was rainy, and this

walk will therefore be repeated in the spring.

Walking wooded trails in West Windsor is an all-season pleasure. Cool in the summer, cozy in the winter, it is part of FOWWOS' mission to make more people aware of these local treasures and understand the value of preserving open space. The trails exist so people can enjoy nature; not for mountain biking or other vehicle-

## Individual Property Plans (IPPs)

Most of West Windsor's open space tax revenue (approximately \$1.5 million) is earmarked for additional land acquisitions. However, the November, 2006, referendum approved an increase in the proportion of those revenues that could be spent on open space "maintenance and development," from "up to 10%" to "up to 25%."

FOWWOS publicly opposed this provision, largely on the grounds that it would reduce the ability of the Township to acquire additional desirable properties as open space. However, when the referendum was approved, FOWWOS took the opportunity to work with the Township administration in developing precise maintenance and development proposals on selected open space properties already purchased by the Township. In other words, FOWWOS became involved in determining how the "up to 25%" of open space tax revenues might appropriately be spent.

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The administration welcomed this involvement and set up a committee consisting of FOWWOS Trustees, some of whom are also Environmental Commission and/or Shade Tree Commission members, and Township staff members, to meet periodically to review draft IPPs for those properties that FOWWOS felt warranted specific maintenance and development budgets.

To date, volunteers have drafted IPPs for seven properties: The Rogers Preserve, Millstone Preserve, Zaitz Preserve, Crawford Woods, Chamberlain Park, Van Nest Park and the Rogers Arboretum.

The initial drafting process has, however, revealed the need for professional help, particularly with estimating the likely cost of proposals, but also with providing and documenting essential site-specific information on environmental aspects such as the presence of invasive vegetative species, the need for reducing fire hazards, and measures that will provide the desirable habitat for indigenous wildlife. To that end, the administration has recently engaged Chris Jepson, an environmental engineer who has served as environmental consultant to the West Windsor Planning and Zoning Boards for many years, to work with the volunteers and staff to provide the necessary information to render IPPs effective and economically viable "manuscripts."

## Past President's Message

Dear Officers and Trustees of the Friends of West Windsor Open Space,

When I author the final version of business letters, I strive to remove the appearance of emotion from my original drafts. This time, I know I will not be successful. Because my eyes keep filling up with a salty liquid, it is impossible for me to write an emotion-neutral letter here.

It is with a deep sense of disappointment that I must render to you my letter of resignation as President of FOWWOS, effective February 29, 2008. I am resigning for reasons beyond my control. As a state employee, I have always had restrictions on outside employment or activity in which I may wish to associate. I have consistently met those obligations without question, as I do today. But those restrictions have changed, causing me, if I were to continue to adhere to conditions placed on me, to become ineffective as an officer or trustee of FOWWOS.

I come from a family which values civic engagement. As a West Windsor resident for only three months, I joined FOWWOS in January 1996, the day the old car was being auctioned for seed money for our infant organization. Since

uninhibited growth of bottom vegetation that clogged the pond's circulation and seriously degraded the quality of its water as a wildlife habitat.

Another important step was taken in 1988, when West Windsor celebrated the 50th anniversary of Orson Welles' radio broadcast of "War of the Worlds," the fictitious play that, by chance, was set in Grovers Mill. The celebration called widespread public attention to the condition of the pond and prompted then-Mayor Forrester to propose a three step plan toward restoration; first, the development of the waterfront at Van Nest Park, which borders the pond, in order to attract people who would support pond restoration, second, restoration of the dam at Clarksville Road (declared hazardous by the Army Corps of Engineers in 1979), and third, to restore the pond itself.

It may have taken twenty years, but the three-step plan is now complete.

then, I have had two children. My daughter was brand new when I was locked out of the car (with her sleeping in it) while placing a roadside sign for the 1998 referendum. Now, my five year old son enjoys running from tree identifier to tree identifier on the walkway at the arboretum. How the Rancan Family has grown with FOWWOS!
